

Discourse (Senior) *The intensive Toronto summer debate workshop.*

Location and Time: Larkin Building (15 Devonshire Place) at Trinity College in the University of Toronto from August 25th to 29th, 2014 from 10:00 AM to 4:30 PM daily.

Who: Students entering Gr. 9-12 in Sept. 2014. Taught by two-time World Individual Public Speaking and Debating Champion and independent debate coach Shakir Rahim (see pg. 2).

Registration: Registration is \$495 per student. Please mail a completed registration form (pg. 3) liability waiver (pg. 4), and \$250 cheque deposit to the address on the form. Spots will be reserved on a first-come first-served basis and are limited to 16 students.

Mission

Launched in 2010, the mission of Discourse is to prepare high school students for advanced-level debate and teach them valuable argumentation and communication skills that will last a lifetime. The workshop will be designed to maximize individual attention and an interactive atmosphere. The week will be a blend of instruction and practice, providing students the opportunity to receive feedback on their skills and be prepared for the 2014-2015 season.

Instruction

The workshop will focus on three foundational components: argumentation, content, and delivery. There will be modules on each these sections and the relationship between them. Discourse will integrate seminars, individual and group exercises, and practice debates in multiple styles to develop and strengthen skills. The topics that will be covered are:

Argumentation

- How do you construct an effective case?
 - Topics: the definition; case burdens; model and counter-models; internal case cohesion; argument complementarity; and speaker roles.
- How do you form an argument?
 - Topics: the assertion-reasoning-evidence (ARE) model; and types of evidence and their respective strengths and weaknesses.
- How do you refute and reconstruct?
 - Topics: counter-assertion, counter-reasoning, and counter-evidence; case refutation; formal and informal logical fallacies; POIs and cross-examination; rebuilding the ARE model; and reply speeches.

Content

- How do you research for a prepared debate?
 - Topics: research methods and sources; and specialized social, economic, and political subject instruction.
- How do you formulate content in a short time-frame for an impromptu debate?
 - Topics: the role of the definition; rapid argument brainstorming; and unique implications of impromptu on the ARE model such as the validity of evidence.
- How do you create content that appeals to broad audience?

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- Topics: rhetoric; the use of logos, pathos, and ethos; and persuasive techniques.

Delivery

- How do you differentiate your vocal presentation during a speech?
 - Topics: pace, volume, and emphasis.
- What are other ways to enhance delivery?
 - Topics: gesture, eye contact, and posture.

Coach

Shakir Rahim is an independent debate coach who works with the University of Toronto Schools (UTS), St. Andrew's College (SAC), and private students. He was a debate coach at Branksome Hall School from 2008-2013. In his high school career, Shakir won the World Individual Debating and Public Speaking Championships twice and attended four times. He has been profiled by the *National Post*, *CBC Radio*, *The Vancouver Sun*, *Vancouver Magazine*, and *Breakfast Television* for his achievements. His other titles included: International Independent Schools Debate Champion, member of Team Canada to the Pan-American Debate Championships, Canadian Public Speaking Champion, Canadian Junior National Debating Champion, and five-time BC Debating Champion. In 2013, Shakir completed a project Queenstown, South Africa where he instructed public speaking and debate at the Queenstown Get Ahead Project School (QGAP) under the aegis of the Toronto-based Leacock Foundation.

Shakir's students have attended and won the World Individual Public Speaking and Debating Championships, the International Independent Schools Public Speaking Championships, the Senior and Junior Ontario Debate Championships, and been selected for the Canadian team to the World Schools Debate Championships. At the University of Toronto, Shakir served as a member of the Academic Board of the U of T Governing Council and Vice-President of the Association of Political Science Students. He also sits on the Board of Directors of the Canadian International Council Toronto Branch, a foreign affairs NGO. He was a recipient of the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medal in 2013.

Timing

Students should be dropped off at 10 am and picked up at 4:30 pm from the Larkin Building. Students will be escorted to Hazelton Lanes Mall for lunch, approximately a ten-minute walk, where they may bring their own lunch or purchase food from Whole Foods or another establishment.
